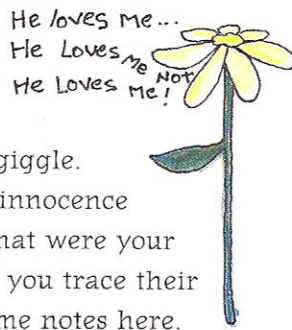


TRAVEL LOG

Ring Around the Rosy

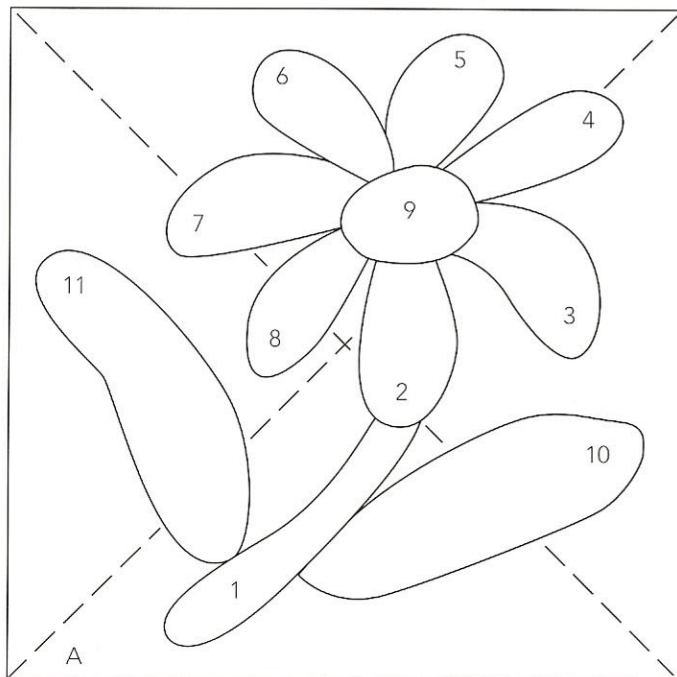

B	4" x 2 1/4"		→ Cut 4 floral
C	2 1/4"		→ Cut 4 accent
D	3 3/8"		→ Cut 2 dark

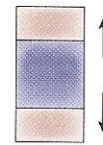
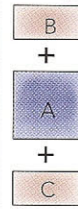
6 Background 1

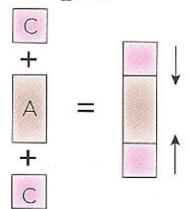


APPLIQUÉ PATTERN FOR DAISY

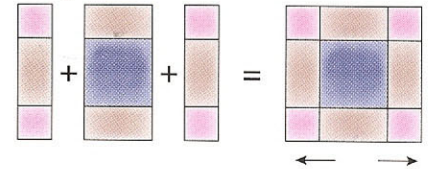

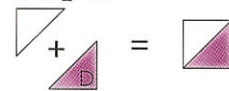

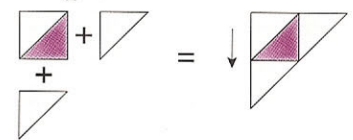

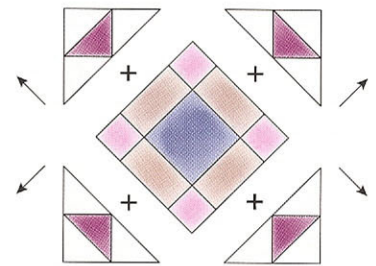

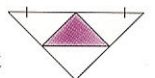

Step 6: Join to center of block.



Here's a great hint when lining up this triangle unit with the block center. Use a ruler to measure in 3/8" from the tips of the long side of each triangle unit. Make a small mark on the wrong side of the fabric. We'll call this a matching mark. Match this mark to the raw edge of the center square. The result should be equal bunny ears on each side of the square. So easy and so helpful!



Step 7: Make a tracing paper overlay for the daisy. Appliqué to center A. HOORAY!
